


Figure 2. Leaving the hotel

Two other offices are the same floor where most of the programmers and designers reside. The fourth office is on a lower floor of the building and has several of our artists.




Figure 9. Worker bee office

Like many software companies these days, much of our work force works from home now. However, most of the team is close by so they can come in at least once a week (generally for Monday staff meetings).




Figure 10. Another development office




Figure 11. Alex working hard on DCS: A-10C!
